Watch out – fraudsters about

There is some evidence of fraudsters contacting people, mainly by email or phone, saying they are from the contact and trace team and that you have been in contact with someone with the COVID-19 virus. They ask for your personal details, which can then be used to steal your identity. Don't be fooled. DO NOT give personal details to anyone contacting you - if in doubt, just put down the phone. If you are concerned you may have symptoms, use www.nhs.uk/coronavirus or call 111 (some sites say 119, but 111 will advise). If you think you have been in contact with someone with symptoms, then for 14 days: stay in and self-isolate; get food delivered (Lesley can help you to arrange this if you cannot get hold of family, friends or local council to help).

I was shocked. Usually Australians boo meringue.

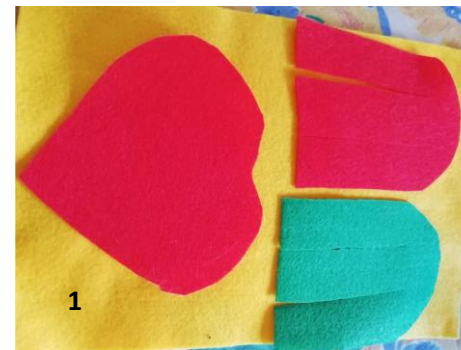

Felt Hearts - What to Do



1. Use three pieces of felt, one heart shaped and two shaped and cut as shown (1)

2. Weave the two shaped pieces together (2)

3. Put a little wadding between the woven pieces and the heart, and sew together round the outside (3) (needle and thread are supplied)

Remember, to be really safe, wrap the heart (in paper, small bag, anything you have handy) for 72hrs. before giving it to someone else

Nipper, the HMV logo dog

Francis Barraud, an English painter, had a brother, Mark; when Mark died, Francis inherited a phonograph player, recordings of Mark's voice, and Mark's dog, Nipper. He was called Nipper because he would nip the backs of visitors' legs.

Francis noticed that when he played the records, Nipper would run to the phonograph looking puzzled, as if trying to make out where the voice was coming from. This scene remained in Francis's mind, and three years after Nipper died, he painted it, calling it 'His Master's Voice'.

Barraud offered to sell the original picture of a wind-up Edison-Bell cylinder phonograph to the Edison-Bell Company located in the USA, but was turned down. In 1899, Barraud went to the offices of The Gramophone Company to borrow a brass horn to replace the original black one on the painting. The manager suggested that if he replaced the machine with a Berliner disc gramophone, he would buy the painting, and it became the trademark of the Victor, HMV, and later other record labels. The original oil painting hung in the EMI boardroom in Hayes, Middlesex, for many years.

A Memory of War, from a former Nursing Sister

My uncle was a taxi driver who brought the news of all the happenings on the island. One day he came home to say that at midnight a German submarine had bombed the Lady Nelson – that there were no casualties, but the ship was badly damaged. The Lady Nelson was a cruise ship, bringing visitors to visit the island. The ship that was protecting it had run the submarine out of the island.



In the broadcast on the day following the incident, all residents were asked to purchase black curtains to display at 6pm to bring the island into complete darkness. At 6pm it was repeated on loudspeaker: 'O yea, O yea, O yea, blackout, O yea, O yea, blackout, all black curtains must be displayed to bring the island into complete darkness. This means no housework, no activities,


no homework. Any person showing light will be prosecuted – prison'. That was our time of war. The bright light on the Lady Nelson had brought the submarine to cause the accident.



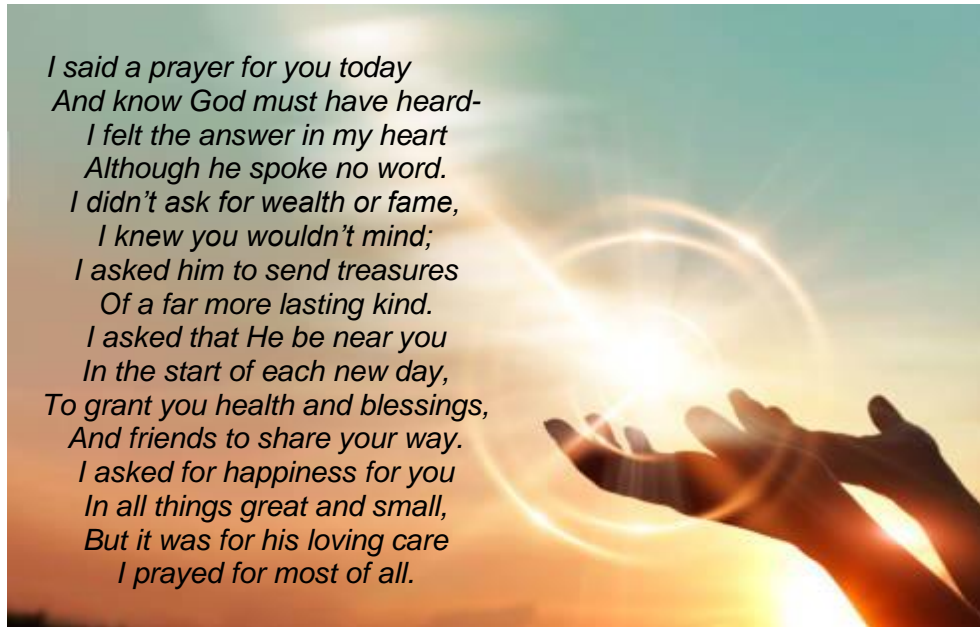
Note: RMS Lady Nelson was torpedoed by U-161 while alongside at Port Castries, St. Lucia, on 10th March 1942. 15 passengers, 3 crewmen and 7 dock workers were killed. The ship sank at the wharf, but was later re-floated and served as a hospital ship for the Canadian Army until the end of the war
